1 SECTION 1. To provide for supplementing certain items in the  
 2 general appropriation act and other appropriation acts for fiscal  
 3 year 2001, the sums set forth in section 2 are hereby appropriated  
 4 from the General Fund unless specifically designated otherwise  
 5 herein or in said appropriation acts, for the several purposes and  
 6 subject to the conditions specified herein or in said appropriation  
 7 acts, and subject to the provisions of law regulating the disburse-

 9 vided that said sums shall be in addition to any amounts

15 shall be held as an expendable trust and shall not be subject to fur-  
16 ther appropriation. No expenditure made from said fund shall  
17 cause said fund to be in deficit at the close of each fiscal year.

18 The secretary of the executive office of health and human serv-  
19 ices is hereby authorized to allocate amounts in said fund to agen-  
20 cies within said executive office to meet the costs of compliance  
21 with HIPAA where the amounts otherwise available are insuffi-  
22 cient for such purpose, in accordance with an allocation plan to be  
23 filed in advance with the secretary of administration and finance  
24 and the house and senate committees on ways and means. Said  
25 secretary shall also file a quarterly report with the house and  
26 senate committees on ways and means detailing by each agency  
27 under the executive office of health and human services informa-  
28 tion which shall include, but not be limited to, the following:  
29 (a) year-to-date expenditures from said fund and estimated year-  
30 end expenditures, (b) the status of HIPAA compliance, (c) steps  
31 necessary to attain full compliance with HIPAA and the estimated  
32 associated costs, and (d) year-to-date revenues credited to said  
33 fund and estimated year-end receipts.

 6 short of the additional \$51,562,493 distributed to cities and towns  
 7 in accordance with the schedule listed below, final adjustments of  
 8 lottery distribution to cities and towns shall be made by the state  
 9 treasurer by adjusting downward the second quarterly payment of  
 10 fiscal year 2002, through the lottery formula, so called, so as to  
 11 apportion the shortfall.
