AN ACT

Making Appropriations for Salaries and Expenses in the Department of the Secretary of the Commonwealth.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned
2 are appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury
3 of the commonwealth, from the ordinary revenue,
4 for the department of the secretary of the com-
5 monwealth, for the fiscal year ending on the
6 thirtieth day of November, nineteen hundred and
7 thirteen, to wit:—

8 For the salary of the secretary of the common-
9 wealth, five thousand dollars. (Rev. Laws, ch.
10 5; Acts 1907, ch. 276.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$5,000.)

11 For the salary of the first deputy, three thou-
12 sand dollars. (Acts 1908, ch. 561; 1912, ch. 522.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$3,000.)

13 For the salary of Herbert H. Boynton, deputy,
14 three thousand dollars. (Acts 1910, ch. 66.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$3,000.)

15 For the salary of the present corporation clerk,
16 two thousand dollars. (Acts 1908, ch. 496.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$2,000.)

17 For the salary of the chief of the archives divi-
18 sion, two thousand dollars. (Rev. Laws, ch. 5.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$2,000.)

19 For the salary of the commission clerk, fifteen
20 hundred dollars. (Acts 1912, ch. 362.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$1,100, — part of a year.)

21 For the salary of the cashier, a sum not exceed-
22 ing twelve hundred dollars. (Rev. Laws, ch. 5.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$1,200.)

23 For messengers and additional clerical assist-
24 ance, a sum not exceeding thirty-three thousand
25 five hundred and fifty dollars. (Rev. Laws, ch. 5.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$28,500.)

26 For incidental and contingent expenses, a sum
27 not exceeding five thousand dollars. (Rev. Laws,
28 ch. 5.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$5,150.)

29 For the arrangement and preservation of state
30 records and papers, a sum not exceeding one thou-
31 sand dollars. (Acts 1885, ch. 337.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$2,000.)

32 For postage and expressage on documents, and
33 for printing and mailing copies of bills and re-
34 solves to certain state, city and town officials, a
35 sum not exceeding fifty-five hundred dollars.
36 (Rev. Laws, ch. 9, sect. 15; Acts 1908, ch. 474.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$5,500.)

37 For furnishing cities and towns with ballot
38 boxes and for repairs to the same, a sum not

39 exceeding one thousand dollars. (Acts 1907, ch.
40 560, sect. 218.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$1,000.)

41 For the purchase of apparatus to be used at
42 polling places in the canvass and count of votes,
43 a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dol-
44 lars. (Acts 1907, ch. 560.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$250.)

45 For the purchase of histories of regiments, bat-
46 teries and other military organizations of the
47 Massachusetts volunteers who served in the civil
48 war, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.
49 (Acts 1893, ch. 413.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$1,000.)

50 For the preservation of town records of births,
51 marriages and deaths previous to the year eight-
52 een hundred and fifty, a sum not exceeding fif-
53 teen thousand dollars. (Acts 1902, ch. 470.)

(Appropriation 1912, \$15,000.)

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
