REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To The Citizens of the Town of Mount Washington

The Annual Town elections took place on May 4, 1993 seeing Betsy Wildman elected to fill the position of Selectperson, owing to the resignation of Lewis Austin. Judy Whitbeck was re-elected to a three year term. Barnett Goldstein was again appointed Select-Chairman.

The Town's mission this year was to accomplish goals set previously in FY92/93. This we did in most cases with the following results: The backhoe/loader was paid for, Coding of Towns by-laws and Town records is about completed, giving the Town an updated and categorically itemized manual of Town Doings from 1867 to present date and all combined into one manual for easy reference.

A new furnace was installed in the Town Hall. Chapter 33B reimbursement monies for Town Highway in the amount of \$34,559.00 was received allowing the Highway Department to contract for another mile of road paving, and major study and review as well as decision making concerning E911 for Mt. Washington.

The Selectmen have been reviewing Federal and State mandates among them a mandate that requires the Town to place a handicapped ramp at one of the entrances to the Town Hall before 1995. We hope to have the ramp built in 1994.

This year, two law suits hit the Town of Mount Washington, both of which are against the Selectmen and other Boards and Town Departments. One concerns the cutting of Town trees and brush and the other a personal property issue. No action has been taken toward resolution of either suit at the time of this report.

Finally, and what ought to come first, is the dedication of our secretary, Bette Wright. Bette has been working with the Town for a number of years and has served in just about every capacity and function of town government. The Selectmen sincerely appreciate her abilities, dedication and attention to all matters she comes up against and believe us, there were many difficult issues in 1993 for her to contend with. Her accomplishments deserve reward. Out hats are off to you again, Bette.

We would like to thank the townspeople for their interest and assistance and other Town Boards and Committees. Working together makes us all a bit more appreciative of what the other has to do to get things done. Thank you.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS

The Highway Department met the worst blizzard in 100 years. The town was in a State of Emergency March 13th and 14th. There was an Oshkosh Snofighter waiting for us at Westover AFB if it was needed, it was not. South Egremont assisted us with their brand new grader and winged the roads back. Our deepest thanks were given to Warren (Cricket) Anson, Bill Weigle and the Egremont Selectmen and Police Department. Before it was over twenty-six people had helped us to regain the roads. The new backhoe plowed open the Falls Road which had to be closed temporarily. We put 500 hours on snow removal. Snow drifts in the road on the South end of town were measured at 12 feet.

The Spring thaw took its toll on the dirt roads. "Mud" season as we fondly call it, saw us trucking stone in from West Stockbridge to fill in the ruts and build the road up.

Our summer help cut a lot of brush on the Falls Road, West and East Street. They also cleaned ditches and catch basins. Many thanks to John Bailey, Chris Dombrowski and Mike Zucco.

A great deal of preparation went into East Street getting it ready for black top. A 4x60 foot culvert was installed on the South End of East Street along with an enormous amount of shoulder work. We then laid down over 1000 ton of black top on East Street in three sections starting at the State Park and finishing at the Cross Roads.

New overhead garage doors were installed on the town garage.

We encourage all comments from residents.

The Board of Health is continuing its efforts to familiarize the community with Title V requirements and other programs as mandated by the Commonwealth. The members are reviewing fee schedules to ensure that required services are offered as fairly and conveniently as possible.

It is important that the members of the community understand that a valid perc test is meant to gather information for the design of a system and does not necessarily mean that an acceptable system can be installed. Title V requires an engineered system. Once an existing system fails, the new system must meet current Title V requirements. These regulations are mandated by the Commonwealth and are not subject to local suspension. Routine maintenance by the property owner is necessary and will help reduce the incidence of failure.
