AN ACT AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION TO INSTALL AND MAINTAIN TRAFFIC LIGHTS AT THE INTERSECTION OF RIVER STREET AND MYSTIC VALLEY PARKWAY IN THE TOWN OF ARLINGTON.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

The Constitution of Massachusetts

to the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Six

ARTICLE I. The legislative power shall be vested in the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall be styled the General Court. The Senate shall be composed of six members, and the House of Representatives of not more than thirty members, to be chosen by the people of the several counties of the State.

ARTICLE II. The executive power shall be vested in the Governor and Council. The Governor shall be chosen by the people of the State for a term of four years, and shall hold office until the first of January next following his election.

ARTICLE III. The judicial power shall be vested in the Supreme Judicial Court, and in such inferior courts as the Legislature may from time to time establish. The Supreme Judicial Court shall be composed of five Justices, and shall hold its sessions at the City of Boston.
