The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

RESOLVE IN FAVOR OF CATHERINE A. BERIGAN, OF HANSON.

1 *Resolved*, That, for the purpose of discharging a
2 moral obligation of the commonwealth, and subject
3 to appropriation, there be allowed and paid out of the
4 state treasury to Catherine A. Berigan, welfare agent
5 for the town of Hanson, the sum of three hundred and
6 nineteen dollars and twenty-five cents.

In the year of the first session of the House of Representatives, the first day of the month of January, 1790, the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, That the House do now adjourn until the first day of the month of January, 1791."

The Constitution of the United States

As amended by the Amendments thereto

It shall be the duty of the President to see that the laws are faithfully executed and that he shall take care that the offices of the United States be filled with qualified persons. He shall have the power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment. He shall have the power to make treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur. He shall have the power to nominate and to receive, and to commission officers of the United States.
