RESOLUTIONS ON THE OCCASION OF THE TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY
OF THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NATIONAL ACADEMY OF THE
FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION.

Whereas, July twenty-ninth will mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the establishment of the National Academy of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, an institution which has rendered an outstanding service to the American people in training members of federal, state and local law enforcement agencies in the relentless struggle against crime; and

Whereas, The establishment of this outstanding academy was due in no small measure to the vision and initiative of J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who recognized the need for uniform training systems, and for the utilization of advanced scientific methods in the field of law enforcement, particularly in the detection and apprehension of criminals; and

Whereas, Law enforcement in this commonwealth and many of its political subdivisions has benefited greatly by the attendance at the National Academy of the Federal Bureau of Investigation of members of their law enforcement agencies; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Massachusetts senate extends its sincere congratulations upon the silver anniversary of the National Academy of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and to the staff of the academy; and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary of the commonwealth transmit forthwith copies of these resolutions to J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D. C.
