RESOLUTIONS EXTENDING GREETINGS TO SPEAKER JOHN W. MCCORMACK ON THE OCCASION OF HIS HISTORIC VISIT TO THE GENERAL COURT ON MARCH 16, 1966.

1 *Whereas*, The Governor of the Commonwealth has officially  
2 proclaimed March sixteenth, nineteen hundred and sixty-six as  
3 John W. McCormack Day in honor of the Speaker of the United  
4 States House of Representatives; and

5 *Whereas*, On this sixteenth day of March, nineteen hun-  
6 dred and sixty-six, the General Court in joint convention has  
7 assembled to hear an address by the Honorable John W.  
8 McCormack; and

9 *Whereas*, Truly as Sir Winston Churchill called himself a  
10 child of Parliament, then surely Speaker McCormack can right-  
11 fully be called a child of the Massachusetts House of Repre-  
12 sentatives, for it was in this historic chamber that he began  
13 his political life over forty-five years ago; and

14 *Whereas*, In those forty-five years, as a Representative and  
15 as a Senator in our great and General Court, as a Congressman  
16 in the United States House of Representatives, where he holds  
17 the exalted position of Speaker, our distinguished and esteemed  
18 guest has been the epitome of the best of public servants,  
19 humble, dedicated, sympathetic to the needs of his fellow man,  
20 courageous, knowledgeable, and above all a truly Christian  
21 gentleman; and

22 *Whereas*, In days of crisis, of plenty, of depression, of war,  
23 of peace, he has been in the forefront to initiate, to foster, to  
24 guide through and to pursue legislation to meet the needs of  
25 the day, a man for all seasons; therefore be it

26 *Resolved*, That the Massachusetts House of Representatives  
27 extends its warmest greetings to one of its most famous sons,  
28 and its best wishes to Speaker and Mrs. McCormack for con-  
29 tinued good health and happiness; and be it further

30 *Resolved*, That an engrossed copy of these resolutions be  
31 forwarded by the Secretary of the Commonwealth to the  
32 Honorable John W. McCormack, Speaker of the United States  
33 House of Representatives.
