Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-eight.

AN ACT

Making Appropriations for Salaries and Expenses at the State Prison, Massachusetts Reformatory, the Reformatory Prison for Women and for Expenses in Connection therewith.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned
2 are appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury of
3 the Commonwealth, from the ordinary revenue,
4 for the purposes specified, to meet expenses for
5 the year ending on the thirty-first day of Decem-
6 ber, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, to wit:—
7 For the payment of salaries and wages at the
8 state prison at Boston, a sum not exceeding fifty-
9 two thousand dollars; and for other current ex-
10 penses at said institution, a sum not exceeding
11 sixty-nine thousand dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap.
12 221; Acts 1882, chap. 203; 1884, chap. 95.]

13 For the payment of salaries and wages at the
14 Massachusetts reformatory at Concord, a sum not
15 exceeding fifty-eight thousand dollars; and for
16 other current expenses at said institution a sum
17 not exceeding one hundred and four thousand
18 dollars. [Acts 1884, chap. 255.]

19 For the payment of salaries and wages at the
20 reformatory prison for women at Sherborn a sum
21 not exceeding twenty-four thousand dollars; and
22 for other current expenses at said institution,
23 thirty-two thousand four hundred dollars.

25 For expenses incurred in removing prisoners
26 to and from the reformatory prison for women, a
27 sum not exceeding two hundred dollars. [Pub.
28 Stat., chap. 219.]

29 For expenses incurred in removing prisoners to
30 and from the Massachusetts reformatory, a sum
31 not exceeding one thousand dollars. [Acts 1884,
32 chap. 255, sect. 18.]

33 For the payment of the cost of supporting
34 prisoners removed from the reformatory prison
35 for women, a sum not exceeding four hundred
36 dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 219, sect. 12.]

37 For board of prisoners removed from the Mas-
38 sachusetts reformatory, a sum not exceeding four
39 hundred dollars. [Acts 1884, chap. 255.]

40 For the salary of the agent for aiding convicts
41 discharged from the state prison, one thousand
42 dollars; and for expenses of such agent a sum
43 not exceeding three thousand dollars, to be used

44 in rendering assistance to said convicts. [Pub.
45 Stat., chap. 219, sect. 26.]

46 For the salary of the agent for aiding dis-
47 charged female convicts, discharged from the
48 prisons of the Commonwealth, a sum not exceed-
49 ing seven hundred dollars; and for expenses of
50 said agent, and for assistance to said convicts, a
51 sum not exceeding twenty-three hundred dollars.

53 For aiding prisoners discharged from the
54 Massachusetts reformatory, a sum not exceeding
55 five thousand dollars. [Acts 1884, chap. 255:
56 1887, chap. 395.]

57 For incidental and contingent expenses of the
58 commissioners of prisons, a sum not exceeding
59 eight hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 219.]

60 For travelling expenses of the commissioners
61 of prisons, and of the secretary thereof, a sum not
62 exceeding one thousand dollars. [Pub. Stat.,
63 chap. 219.]

64 For travelling expenses of the agents of the
65 commissioners of prisons, a sum not exceeding
66 five hundred dollars. [Acts 1887, chap. 315.]

67 For expenses incurred in the arrest of fugitives
68 from justice, a sum not exceeding two thousand
69 dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 218, sect. 6.]

1 SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
