## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twelve.

### RESOLVE

To provide for Annual Reports by the Board of Education as to All Educational Institutions receiving Financial Aid from the Commonwealth.

1     *Resolved*, That the board of education is hereby au-  
2 thORIZED and directed to make annually to the general  
3 court a report relative to all educational institutions  
4 which receive financial aid from the treasury of the com-  
5 monwealth in the shape of annual grants or otherwise.  
6 Such annual reports shall contain expressions of opinion,  
7 and recommendations by the board relative to the neces-  
8 sity and desirability of special and general appropriations  
9 requested from the general court for the use of such in-  
10 stitutions; and shall also contain such other facts and  
11 recommendations as the general court may require, or the  
12 board deem advisable and fitting to report, with a view to  
13 promoting the efficiency and economy of the various types  
14 of education aided by the commonwealth in such institu-  
15 tions.

16     In order that it may prepare the reports herein de-  
17 scribed, the board and its agents are hereby authorized  
18 and empowered to visit and inspect the educational and  
19 other activities of such institutions, and to secure from

20 them such reports as it may, from time to time, deem  
21 necessary. The board may, from time to time, employ  
22 special agents to inspect and report on the educational and  
23 other activities of such institutions, and to procure for it  
24 such information as it may require.
