By Mr. Mannering of Boston, petition of Vincent A. Mannering that the permanent appointment be authorized of veterans to civil service employments upon completion of training periods under the G. I. Bill of Rights and the passing of a qualified examination therefor. Civil Service.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE PERMANENT APPOINTMENT OF VETERANS TO CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYMENTS UPON THEIR COMPLETION OF TRAINING PERIODS THEREIN UNDER THE APPRENTICE TRAINING PROVISIONS OF THE G. I. BILL OF RIGHTS, SO CALLED AND THE PASSING OF A QUALIFYING EXAMINATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 1 of chapter 586 of the acts of 1946, as
- 2 amended by section 1 of chapter 392 of the acts of
- 3 1948, is hereby further amended by striking out the
- 4 third paragraph and inserting in place thereof the
- 5 following:—
- 6 Such trainees may be removed by the appointing
- 7 officer within the period of training for cause or for
- 8 inaptitude or unsatisfactory performance of assign-
- 9 ments. No person employed hereunder shall enter the
- 10 permanent civil service during such training except in

11 the manner provided by the civil service law and rules.
12 Any person completing the period of training in any
13 position to which he has been appointed hereunder
14 shall be subjected to a qualifying examination pre-
15 scribed by the director of civil service, and, if he passes,
16 shall be certified for permanent appointment to such
17 position without serving any probationary period.
18 This section shall not be deemed to restrict the rights
19 of a veteran to the benefits under any federal program
20 designed to give training, provided he holds office or
21 employment within the classified civil service and no
22 change in his title or status results thereby.
