Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-Six.

AN ACT

Making Appropriations to meet certain Expenditures authorized the present year, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1 SECT. 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned are
2 appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury of this
3 Commonwealth, from the ordinary revenue, except in
4 cases otherwise ordered, for the purposes specified in
5 certain acts and resolves of the present year, herein
6 cited, and for other purposes, to wit :

7 In the resolve, chapter two, in favor of the Boston
8 Insurance Company, a sum not exceeding one hun-
9 dred and ninety-five dollars and eighty-nine cents.

10 In the resolve, chapter six, relating to the payment
11 of interest on the recruitment fund, a sum not exceed-
12 ing ninety-eight hundred dollars.

13 In the resolve, chapter seven, in favor of C. G.

14 Rowell, a sum not exceeding one hundred and sixty-
15 eight dollars.

16 In the resolve, chapter eleven, in favor of the
17 saving institution of Cambridge, a sum not exceeding
18 ninety-one dollars and fifty-six cents.

19 In the resolve, chapter twelve, in favor of Increase
20 N. Emerton, a sum not exceeding fifty-two dollars.

21 In the resolve, chapter thirteen, in favor of L. R.
22 Haskell, a sum not exceeding three hundred and
23 twenty-five dollars.

24 In the resolve, chapter fourteen, in favor of the
25 Hampden Fire Insurance Company, a sum not
26 exceeding two hundred and seventeen dollars and
27 seventeen cents.

28 In the resolve, chapter fifteen, in favor of Patrick
29 A. O'Connell, a sum not exceeding sixty-five dollars.

30 In the resolve, chapter sixteen, relating to certain
31 Indians, a sum not exceeding two hundred and twenty-
32 nine dollars; and for the support of Indian schools, a
33 sum not exceeding one hundred and four dollars, the
34 latter payable from the income of the Massachusetts
35 school fund.

36 In the resolve, chapter seventeen, relating to the
37 extirpation of the cattle disease, a sum not exceeding
38 twenty thousand dollars.

39 In the resolve, chapter twenty, for the support of
40 certain Indian schools, a sum not exceeding one hun-
41 dred and forty-nine dollars, payable from the income
42 of the Massachusetts school fund.

43 In the resolve, chapter twenty-one, for the support
44 of certain Indians and persons of color, in the year
45 eighteen hundred and sixty-five, a sum not exceeding
46 two hundred and eighty-three dollars and forty cents.

47 In the resolve, chapter twenty-two, in favor of
48 Solomon C. Howland, a sum not exceeding five hun-
49 dred dollars, payable upon properly approved vouchers
50 filed with the state auditor.

51 In the resolve, chapter twenty-eight, relating to the
52 state library, a sum not exceeding nine hundred dol-
53 lars, payable upon properly approved vouchers filed
54 with the state auditor.

55 In the resolve, chapter twenty-nine, in favor of
56 certain agricultural societies, a sum not exceeding
57 twelve hundred dollars.

58 In the resolve, chapter thirty, in favor of the dis-
59 charged soldiers' home, a sum not exceeding twenty
60 thousand dollars.

61 In the resolve, chapter thirty-one, in favor of the
62 asylum for discharged female prisoners, a sum not
63 exceeding twenty-five hundred dollars.

64 In the resolve, chapter thirty-four, in favor of the
65 Massachusetts school for idiotic and feeble-minded
66 youth, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars.

67 In the resolve, chapter thirty-five, relating to pro-
68 vincial laws, a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred
69 dollars.

70 In the resolve, chapter thirty-six, in favor of the
71 Perkins' institution and Massachusetts asylum for the
72 blind, a sum not exceeding four thousand dollars.

73 In the resolve, chapter thirty-eight, in relation to
74 battle-flags, a sum not exceeding forty-five hundred

76 In the resolve, chapter thirty-nine, in favor of the
77 town of Truro, a sum not exceeding sixty-one dollars

81 not exceeding thirteen thousand five hundred dollars.

82 In the resolve, chapter forty-one, in favor of certain

86 Springfield home for friendless women and children,
87 a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars.

88 In the resolve, chapter forty-three, in favor of the
89 Washingtonian home, a sum not exceeding six
90 thousand dollars.

91 In the resolve, chapter forty-six, for the benefit of
92 Jemima Easton, a sum not exceeding one hundred
93 and four dollars.

94 In the resolve, chapter forty-seven, for the support
95 of certain Indian schools, a sum not exceeding
96 seventy-five dollars, payable from the income of the
97 Massachusetts school fund.

98 In the resolve, chapter forty-eight, in favor of the
99 city of Lowell, a sum not exceeding five hundred
100 and fifty dollars.

101 In the resolve, chapter forty-nine, in favor of the
102 Massachusetts charitable eye and ear infirmary, a
103 sum not exceeding thirty-five hundred dollars.

104 In the resolve, chapter fifty, in favor of Henry E.
105 McCollom, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

106 In the resolve, chapter fifty-two, in relation to
107 commemorative tablets, a sum not exceeding five
108 hundred dollars.

109 In the resolve, chapter fifty-four, in favor of the
110 state lunatic hospital at Northampton, a sum not
111 exceeding two thousand dollars, payable upon prop-
112 erly approved vouchers filed with the state auditor.

113 In the resolve, chapter fifty-five, in favor of the
114 Fitchburg railroad company, a sum not exceeding
115 two thousand one hundred and sixty-seven dollars
116 and seventy-six cents.

117 In the resolve, chapter fifty-six, in favor of the
118 oriental coal oil company, a sum not exceeding one
119 hundred and seventy-five dollars and sixty-five cents.

120 In the resolve, chapter sixty, in favor of the
121 guardian of the Punkapoag Indians, a sum not
122 exceeding three hundred and fifty-six dollars.

180 For the salary of the commissioner on savings
181 banks, the sum of three thousand dollars. [Acts

183 For books of instruction, and for orderly and roll
184 books, a sum not exceeding four hundred dollars.
185 [Acts 1866, chap. 219.]

186 For military accounts of the present year, a sum
187 not exceeding one thousand dollars, in addition to
188 the amount heretofore appropriated. [Acts 1866,
189 chap. 219.]

190 For militia bounty for the present year, a sum
191 not exceeding twenty thousand dollars, in addition
192 to the amount heretofore appropriated. [Acts 1866,
193 chap. 219.]

194 For the salary of the second clerk in the office of
195 the auditor of accounts, a sum not exceeding three
196 hundred dollars, in addition to the amount hereto-
197 fore appropriated. [Acts 1866, chap. 101.]

198 For compensation and expenses of the harbor
199 commissioners, a sum not exceeding ten thousand
200 dollars. [Acts 1866, chap. 149.]

201 For the payment from the state treasury of aid
202 to Massachusetts volunteers residing out of the
203 Commonwealth, a sum not exceeding twenty thou-
204 sand dollars. [Acts 1866, chap. 172.]

205 For expenses of the commissioners on obstruc-
206 tions to the passage of fish, a sum not exceeding
207 seven thousand dollars. [Acts 1866, chap. 238.]

208 For compensation and expenses of the state
209 police, a sum not exceeding seventeen thousand one
210 hundred dollars, viz.: for compensation, twelve thou-

211 sand nine hundred dollars; for travelling expenses,
212 three thousand dollars; for clerical, incidental and
213 contingent expenses of the constable of the Com-
214 monwealth, twelve hundred dollars. [Acts 1866,
215 chap. 261.]

216 For the office of the insurance commissioner,
217 from the first of July of the present year, a sum not
218 exceeding fifteen hundred dollars, viz.: for the salary
219 of the commissioner, one thousand dollars; and for
220 the salary of the commissioner's clerk, five hundred
221 dollars. [Acts 1866, chap. 255.]

222 For printing and binding, ordered by the senate
223 or house of representatives, or by the concurrent
224 order of the two branches, for the present year, a
225 sum not exceeding one thousand dollars, in addition
226 to the amount heretofore appropriated. [Res. 1856,
227 chap. 74.]

228 For clerical and incidental expenses of the tax
229 commissioner for the present year, a sum not exceed-
230 ing twenty-five hundred dollars, in addition to the
231 amount heretofore appropriated. [Acts 1864-65,
232 chap. 208 and 283.]

233 For military accounts of the year eighteen hun-
234 dred and sixty-five and previous years, a sum not
235 exceeding eight hundred dollars, in addition to the
236 amount heretofore appropriated. [Gen. Stat., chap.
237 13; Acts 1864-65, chap. 238 and 250.]

238 For military services rendered under a special
239 order of the commander-in-chief in the year eighteen
240 hundred and sixty-four, a sum not exceeding eighty-
241 six dollars and sixty cents. [Acts 1864, chap. 238,
242 sect. 148.]

243 For military salutes ordered by the late executive

244 of the Commonwealth in honor of emancipation, a
245 sum not exceeding seven hundred dollars. [Acts
246 1864, chap. 238.]

247 For expenses of the departments of the quarter-
248 master-general and master of ordnance, for the
249 present year, a sum not exceeding five hundred
250 dollars, in addition to the amount heretofore appro-
251 priated. [Acts 1864, chap. 238.]

252 For militia bounty for the year eighteen hundred
253 and sixty-three, a sum not exceeding three hundred
254 and forty dollars, payable in accordance with rolls
255 on file in the office of the treasurer and receiver-
256 general, upon which said sum was allowed to officers
257 and privates, the same having remained uncalled for
258 during the period within which payment is limited
259 by statute. [Gen Stat., chap. 13.]

260 For expenses of the department of the master of
261 ordnance for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-
262 four, a sum not exceeding two hundred and forty-five
263 dollars and five cents, the same having been hereto-
264 fore allowed on warrants of the governor, but remain-
265 ing uncalled for during the time within which
266 payment is limited by statute. [Acts 1861, chap.
267 219.]

268 For the current expenses of the state prison for
269 the present year, a sum not exceeding fifteen thou-
270 sand dollars, in addition to the amount heretofore
271 appropriated. [Acts 1864, chap. 303.]

272 For the arrest of fugitives from justice, for the
273 present year, a sum not exceeding one thousand
274 dollars, in addition to the amount heretofore appro-
275 priated. [Gen. Stat., chap. 177.]

276 For expenses of the state reform school for boys

277 at Westborough, for the year eighteen hundred and
278 sixty-five, a sum not exceeding two thousand three
279 hundred and thirty-one dollars and thirty-two cents.

280 [Gen. Stat., chap. 76.]

281 For expenses of the nautical branch of the state
282 reform school, for the year eighteen hundred and
283 sixty-five, a sum not exceeding one thousand two
284 hundred and fifty-four dollars, in addition to the
285 amount heretofore appropriated. [Gen. Stat., chap.
286 76.]

287 For expenses of the state almshouse at Tewksbury,
288 for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-five, a sum
289 not exceeding one thousand three hundred and thirty-
290 three dollars and eighty-four cents, in addition to the
291 amount heretofore appropriated; and for the present
292 year, a sum not exceeding four thousand dollars, in
293 addition to the amount heretofore appropriated.

295 For expenses of the state almshouse at Monson,
296 for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-five, a sum
297 not exceeding five hundred and sixteen dollars and
298 forty-eight cents, in addition to the amount hereto-
299 fore appropriated; and for the present year, a sum
300 not exceeding three thousand dollars, in addition to
301 the amount heretofore appropriated. [Gen. Stat.,

303 For expenses of the state almshouse at Bridge-
304 water, for the present year, a sum not exceeding four
305 thousand dollars, in addition to the amount hereto-
306 fore appropriated. [Gen. Stat., chap. 71.]

307 For expenses of the hospital at Rainsford Island,
308 for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-five, a sum
309 not exceeding three hundred and sixty-four dollars

310 and eighty-five cents, in addition to the amount
311 heretofore appropriated. [Gen. Stat., chap. 71.]

312 For expenses of the secretary of the board of
313 state charities, a sum not exceeding eleven hundred
314 dollars. [Acts 1863, chap. 240, sect. 3.]

315 For travelling and other expenses of the board of
316 state charities, a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred
317 dollars, in addition to the amount heretofore appro-
318 priated; and the appropriations for said board may
319 be drawn and disbursed by the general agent. [Acts
320 1863, chap. 240.]

321 For the support of state scholarships, a sum not
322 exceeding three thousand six hundred dollars, pay-
323 able from the income of the Massachusetts school
324 fund. [Acts 1866, chap. 210.]

325 For repairs on the Essex bridge for the year
326 eighteen hundred and sixty-five, a sum not exceed-
327 ing thirty-one dollars and thirty-one cents, payable
328 from the Essex bridge fund. [Acts 1859, chap.
329 122.]

330 For repairs on the Warren bridge for the present
331 year, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars, in
332 addition to the amount heretofore appropriated, pay-
333 able from the Charles river and Warren bridge fund.

335 For court expenses of the attorney-general's
336 department for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-
337 three, a sum not exceeding five dollars. [Gen. Stat.,

341 a sum not exceeding thirty-nine dollars and sixty-

343 For expenses of printing and distributing state
344 aid documents authorized by chapter one hundred
345 and seventy-two of the acts of the present session, a
346 sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.

347 For printing the report of the board of agricul-
348 ture, a sum not exceeding seven hundred and fifty
349 dollars and ninety-four cents, in addition to the
350 amount heretofore appropriated. [Res. 1856, chap.
351 74.]

352 For the balance due on ordnance purchased in
353 England, a sum not exceeding twenty-five thousand
354 dollars, payable from the coast defence fund. [Acts
355 1863, chap. 118.]

356 For the compensation and expenses of legislative
357 committees, viz.: of the committee on the location
358 of railway passenger houses, a sum not exceeding
359 two hundred dollars; of the committee on the sub-
360 ject of state aid for returned soldiers and others, a
361 sum not exceeding seven hundred and forty-five dol-
362 lars and fifty-five cents; of the committee on the
363 Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel, a
364 sum not exceeding four hundred dollars; of the
365 committee on the state liquor agency, a sum not
366 exceeding four hundred dollars; of the committee
367 on finance and taxation, a sum not exceeding
368 five hundred and forty-five dollars and sixty-three

370 For publishing the list of petitions to the legisla-
371 ture, a sum not exceeding seventy-five dollars.
372 [Acts 1865, chap. 245.]

373 For the arrest of fugitives from justice in the
374 year eighteen hundred and sixty-four, a sum not
375 exceeding eleven dollars. [Gen. Stat., chap. 177.]

376 For newspapers furnished the departments in the
377 state house during the years eighteen hundred and
378 sixty-three, eighteen hundred and sixty-four and
379 eighteen hundred and sixty-five, a sum not exceed-
380 ing one hundred dollars. [Acts 1861, chap. 203.]

381 For printing and binding the extra edition of the
382 adjutant-general's report ordered by the present leg-
383 islature, a sum not exceeding seventeen thousand
384 dollars. [Res. 1856, chap. 74.]

385 For printing and binding the blue book for the
386 present year, a sum not exceeding one thousand dol-
387 lars, in addition to the amount heretofore appro-
388 priated. [Gen. Stat., chap. 3.]

389 The following sums shall be allowed and paid:—

390 For the compensation of experts employed by the
391 governor for the present year, a sum not exceeding
392 five hundred dollars.

393 For clerical and professional assistance to legisla-
394 tive committees, the same to include service rendered
395 by any clerk in the employ of the state, without
396 interference with his regular duties, a sum not
397 exceeding five hundred dollars.

398 For expenses incurred in the erection of a flag-
399 staff, and in the purchase and transportation of a
400 safe for the state arsenal at Cambridge, a sum not
401 exceeding nine hundred and seventy-seven dollars
402 and fifty-one cents.

403 For expenses of the Massachusetts commissioner
404 on the soldiers' national cemetery at Gettysburg, a
405 sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

406 For engraving plates and for printing and ad-
407 vertising of state scrip, a sum not exceeding one
408 thousand dollars.

409 For the purchase of standard weights and meas-
410 ures for the towns of Mattapoisett, Gosnold, and
411 Hudson, and for expenses of adjusting the state
412 weights and measures, a sum not exceeding nine
413 hundred and fifty dollars.

414 For medical, surgical and hospital supplies, and
415 contingent expenses connected therewith, the same
416 being for the use of the state militia, a sum not
417 exceeding two thousand dollars.

418 For the purchase of such statutes and other pub-
419 lic documents of this Commonwealth, for the benefit
420 of other states, as the governor may direct, a sum
421 not exceeding four hundred dollars.

422 For recording title deeds of Indian lands at Gay
423 Head, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

424 For plans and lithographs procured by the com-
425 mittee on the state house, subject to the approval of
426 the governor and council, a sum not exceeding one
427 thousand dollars.

428 For packing-boxes for the extra edition of the
429 adjutant-general's report ordered by the present legis-
430 lature, and for expenses of packing, a sum not
431 exceeding two hundred dollars.

432 For the erection of a fence upon the grounds of
433 the state arsenal, at Cambridge, under the provisions
434 of chapter eighty-three of the resolves of the
435 present year, a sum not exceeding one thousand
436 dollars.

437 For expenses of such advertising as may be found
438 necessary in connection with the disbursement of
439 state aid, a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars.

440 For the compensation of such staff officers as
441 the commander-in-chief may appoint under the pro-

442 visions of chapter two hundred and nineteen of the
443 acts of the present year, and for the compensation
444 of such clerks and employés as said staff officers
445 may appoint, with the approval of the commander-
446 in-chief, the same to be determined by him, a sum
447 not exceeding sixty-six hundred dollars, viz.: for
448 the bureau of the quartermaster-general, twenty-
449 one hundred dollars; and for the bureau of the
450 surgeon-general, forty-five hundred dollars; and
451 the adjutant-general may hereafter employ such
452 additional clerks and assistants as the business of
453 his department may require, at a salary not exceed-
454 ing eleven hundred dollars per annum for each per-
455 son employed, the appointment and compensation of
456 the service to be first approved by the governor, and
457 the latter payable from the date of appointment.

458 For the compensation and expenses of the com-
459 missioners on the state house, authorized by chapter
460 eighty-seven of the resolves of the present year, a
461 sum not exceeding three thousand dollars.

462 For incidental expenses of the insurance commis-
463 sioner, a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars.

464 For the mileage of Roger H. Leavitt, as a mem-
465 ber of the present legislature, a sum not exceeding
466 twenty-six dollars.

467 The balance of the appropriation made in chapter
468 thirty-nine of the acts of the year eighteen hundred
469 and sixty-five, for quartermasters' supplies is hereby
470 made applicable for the same purpose during the
471 present year.

472 The appropriation made in chapter seventy-three
473 of the acts of the present year, to sheriffs, for the

474 distribution of blanks and return of votes, shall be
475 held to include proclamations.

476 The appropriation made in chapter eighty-eight of
477 the acts of the present year, for expenses of the hos-
478 pital at Rainsford Island, shall be held to include
479 transportation for said institution.

480 The appropriation made in chapter seventy-three
481 of the acts of the present year, for the contingent
482 fund of the governor and council for military pur-
483 poses, shall be held to include such extra clerical
484 service and other contingent expenses of the execu-
485 tive department as the governor may deem necessary.

486 The appropriations made in chapters seventy-three
487 and eighty-eight of the present year, for expenses of
488 the offices of the attorney-general and of the con-
489 stable of the Commonwealth, shall be held to include
490 such contingent expenses as may be necessary for
491 said offices ; and the salary of said constable shall
492 hereafter be paid monthly.

493 The appropriation made in chapter eighty-eight
494 of the acts of the present year, for expenses incurred
495 on account of Indians, shall be held to include the
496 salary of the guardian of the Christiantown and
497 Chappequiddic Indians, and such other expenses on
498 account of Indians as are authorized by statute.

499 The unexpended balance of the appropriation
500 made in chapter thirty-nine of the acts of the year
501 eighteen hundred and sixty-five, for term reports, is
502 hereby made applicable to the same purpose for the
503 present year.

504 The appropriations heretofore made for expenses
505 of the departments of the quartermaster-general and
506 master of ordnance, for expenses of the surgeon-

507 general's department, and for the compensation of
508 the adjutant-general's extra clerks and messenger,
509 shall be held applicable to the same purposes under
510 the provisions of this act and of chapter two hundred
511 and nineteen of the acts of the present year.

1 SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
