

HOUSE No. 2475

By Mr. Patrone of Boston, petition of Charles L. Patrone relative to pensions for certain judges with twenty-five years of continuous service upon attaining the age of seventy years. Pensions and Old Age Assistance.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR PENSIONS FOR CERTAIN JUDGES WITH TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF CONTINUOUS SERVICE UPON ATTAINING THE AGE OF SEVENTY YEARS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 65A of chapter 32 of the General Laws, as most re-
2 cently amended by chapter 670 of the acts of 1956, is hereby
3 further amended by inserting after the third sentence thereof
4 the following sentence: — A chief justice, justice, associate jus-
5 tice, judge or associate judge of any such court or courts who,
6 after having served in any such office or offices at least twenty-
7 five years continuously, and who resigned such office before age
8 of seventy years, shall, upon attaining the age of seventy years,
9 thereupon be entitled to receive a pension for life at an annual
10 rate equal to three fourths of the annual rate of salary payable
11 to him at the time of such resignation, to be paid from the same
12 source and in the same manner as the salaries of like judicial
13 officers of his court are paid.
