The committee on Public Service, to whom were referred the petition (accompanied by resolution, Senate, No. 6) of William I. Hennessey that Congress be memorialized relative to the desirability and justice of reclassifying the wages of letter carriers and clerks in the federal postal service; the petition (accompanied by resolutions, House, No. 1077) of William P. Hickey and another for the adoption of resolutions requesting Congress to increase the compensation of letter carriers and clerks in the postal service; and the petition (accompanied by resolutions, House, No. 1170) of Charles H. McGlue that Congress be memorialized to grant increases in pay to postal employees of the United States government, report the accompanying resolutions.

Resolutions favoring the Passage by Congress of
Legislation increasing the Compensation of Postal
Employees.

1 *Whereas*, There is pending in the congress of the
2 United States a measure increasing the compensa-
3 tion of postal employees from the present unreason-
4 ably low rates to amounts that will more nearly ac-
5 cord with the increased cost of living and the effi-
6 ciency and loyalty which have always characterized
7 the service rendered by said employees, an act of
8 simple justice that has been too long deferred;
9 therefore, be it

10 *Resolved*, That the general court of Massachu-
11 setts respectfully urges upon congress the speedy
12 enactment of legislation that will enable such em-
13 ployees to maintain their families in accordance
14 with American standards of living and will comport
15 with the importance and dignity of the postal serv-
16 ice; and be it further

17 *Resolved*, That copies of these resolutions be
18 sent by the secretary of the commonwealth to the
19 president of the United States, the presiding offi-
20 cers of the senate and house of representatives of
21 the United States, and the senators and representa-
22 tives in congress from Massachusetts.
