**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Two.

AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE SALE OF DYED PAPER PRODUCTS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any special or general law to  
2 the contrary, the sale of dyed paper products within the  
3 commonwealth, including and limited to tissue, toilet paper,  
4 napkins, and towels shall be prohibited.

1 SECTION 2. Violation of this law shall be punishable by a  
2 fine of one hundred dollars.

1 SECTION 3. This law shall not become effective until Sep-  
2 tember 1, 1972.

By Mr. LINDY of Missouri, Committee on Education, in support of the bill (H. R. 2048) to amend the act of March 3, 1907, relating to the National Bureau of Education, and for other purposes.

AN ACT TO AMEND THE ACT OF MARCH 3, 1907, RELATIVE TO THE NATIONAL BUREAU OF EDUCATION.

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, February 2, 1912.
