By Mr. Colonna of Framingham, petition of Anthony M. Colonna that persons engaged in handling of food be required to undergo a physical examination. Public Health.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-One.

AN ACT REQUIRING THAT PERSONS ENGAGED IN HANDLING FOOD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO UNDERGO A PHYSICAL EXAMINATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 111 of the General Laws is hereby amended by in-
2 serting after section 104 the following section: —

3 *Section 104A.* Every person who handles food or beverages
4 in any restaurant, hotel or in any place of business or other
5 establishment of any kind which serves food or beverages to
6 the public shall be examined not less than once every six months
7 in medical centers operated by the department of public health.
8 Every such person shall be given a complete physical examina-
9 tion which shall include blood tests and tubercular tests for the
10 purpose of determining whether such person has any disease or
11 other physical defect or ailment which would, in the opinion of
12 the department, render him unfit to handle food. If such a
13 person is found fit to handle food, he shall be given a certifi-
14 cate by the said department. Such certificate shall contain an
15 expiration date. Any employer who operates a restaurant,
16 hotel or any place of business or other establishment of the
17 type referred to in this section who hires or continues in employ-
18 ment any person who does not have such a certificate in force
19 shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred nor more
20 than one thousand dollars.

The Amendments of Government

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Six

That the Constitution be amended so that the power of the President shall be extended to the period of his term of office.

That the President shall have the right to remove any officer appointed by him, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

That the President shall have the right to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

That the President shall have the right to make treaties, with the advice and consent of the Senate, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur.

That the President shall have the right to appoint and remove officers of the United States, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

That the President shall have the right to grant commissions and receive ambassadors, public ministers and consuls, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

That the President shall have the right to grant and receive such honors and titles as may be established by law.

That the President shall have the right to grant and receive such medals and decorations as may be established by law.

That the President shall have the right to grant and receive such honorary citizenships as may be established by law.

That the President shall have the right to grant and receive such honorary degrees as may be established by law.

That the President shall have the right to grant and receive such honorary memberships as may be established by law.
