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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

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In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Four.

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An Act relative to the Holding of Other Salaried Offices by Certain Officials of the City of Lynn.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Section nineteen of chapter three hundred and  
2 forty of the Special Acts of nineteen hundred and  
3 seventeen, as amended by chapter ninety-six of the  
4 acts of nineteen hundred and twenty-two, is hereby  
5 further amended by adding at the end thereof the  
6 following:—The provisions of this section shall  
7 not apply to any member of the city council who re-  
8 signs in order to be appointed to hold the office of  
9 mayor.

The Commission on the Administration of the Government of the District of Columbia, established by Public Law 85-564, 85 Stat. 1361, October 19, 1968, and continued by Public Law 90-131, 86 Stat. 275, August 1, 1972, and Public Law 93-150, 88 Stat. 488, December 1, 1974, has the honor to submit herewith its report.

### The Administration of the District of Columbia

The Commission was organized in October 1968 to study and report on the administration of the District of Columbia. It was composed of representatives from the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Branches of the Federal Government, and from the private sector. The Commission's mandate was to identify and recommend solutions to the problems of the District's administration, with particular emphasis on the areas of budget, personnel, and management. The Commission's report is organized into four main sections: (1) an overview of the District's administration; (2) a detailed analysis of the budget process; (3) a study of the personnel system; and (4) a general study of management practices. The Commission's findings and recommendations are set forth in detail in the body of the report. It is the Commission's belief that the implementation of these recommendations will result in a more efficient and economical administration of the District of Columbia.
