

HOUSE No. 2956

By Mr. Asiaf of Brockton, petition of Joseph F. Battles that the city of Brockton be authorized to pay him a sum of money for damages resulting from certain land taking by said city. Municipal Finance.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF BROCKTON TO PAY A SUM OF MONEY TO JOSEPH F. BATTLES OF BROCKTON, MASSACHUSETTS, FOR DAMAGES RESULTING FROM CERTAIN LAND TAKING BY THE CITY OF BROCKTON.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the con-
2 trary and in order to discharge a moral obligation, the city of
3 Brockton is hereby authorized to pay to Joseph F. Battles of
4 Brockton, Massachusetts, the sum of sixteen thousand dollars
5 as damages in connection with the taking by the city of Brock-
6 ton by eminent domain of a parcel of land owned by the said
7 Joseph F. Battles in the vicinity of Oak street, North Warren
8 avenue extension and Herrod avenue extension, for school pur-
9 poses, the time having expired within which a petition could
10 legally be brought for assessment of damages because of said
11 land taking.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Administration of the House
