Substituted by the House, on motion of Mr. O Keefe of Peabody, for a House report of the committee on Pensions and Old Age Assistance, reference to the next annual session, on the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 2031) of Cornelius J. Kiley, Leo F. McGrath (mayor) and others that the city of Peabody be authorized to reinstate (for retirement purposes only) John E. Sullivan as an employee of the J. B. Thomas Hospital in said city. May 17.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Eight.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE REINSTATEMENT OF JOHN E. SULLIVAN IN THE SERVICE OF THE CITY OF PEABODY FOR THE PURPOSE OF RETIREMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. John E. Sullivan, who was employed
2 in the J. B. Thomas Hospital of the city of Peabody
3 from the year nineteen hundred and seven to May
4 seventeenth, nineteen hundred and thirty-nine, shall
5 be reinstated by said city in the service of said hospital
6 for the purpose of being retired as hereinafter provided.
7 Upon such reinstatement said Sullivan shall pay into
8 the annuity savings fund of the contributory retire-
9 ment system the amount of the accumulated regular
10 deductions withdrawn by him when he became sepa-
11 rated from the service of the city, plus interest to the

12 date of deposit. Upon such deposit he shall be
13 credited with all service actually rendered as a member
14 of the system as well as all prior service credit to which
15 he had been entitled, and in addition with all service
16 rendered to the J. B. Thomas Hospital of said city in
17 the same manner as if such service were rendered as an
18 employee of the city. After such reinstatement said
19 Sullivan shall be retired by the retirement board and
20 shall receive a retirement allowance as provided by
21 law.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect when accepted
2 by vote of the city council subject to the provisions of
3 the charter.
