AN ACT IMPOSING CRIMINAL PENALTIES FOR TRESPASS UPON STRATEGIC PUBLIC UTILITY PREMISES OR FACILITIES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 266 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting
2 after Section 120D the following new section: —

3 *Section 120E.* Whoever, intentionally and without right, enters
4 or remains in or upon strategic public utility premises or facilities,
5 or enclosed land appurtenant thereto, after having been forbidden
6 so to do by the public utility which has the lawful control of such
7 premises or facilities, either directly or by notice posted thereon,
8 shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1,000 or more than
9 \$10,000 or by imprisonment for not more than two and one-half
10 years.

11 “Strategic public utility premises or facilities”, as used herein,
12 shall include facilities used in the storage of liquefied natural gas,
13 facilities used for the storage of liquid petroleum products used in
14 the manufacture of natural gas substitutes by gas public utilities,
15 facilities used for the manufacture of natural gas or natural gas
16 substitutes from liquid petroleum products by gas public utilities,
17 facilities used for storage of natural gas by gas public utilities, and
18 facilities used for the generation or transmission of electric energy
19 or for the storage of any fuels used for such generation by electric
20 public utilities.
