AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE PLACE OF RESIDENCE OF APPLICANTS FOR ASSISTANCE OF DISABLED PERSONS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 2 of chapter 118D of the General Laws, inserted by
2 section 2 of chapter 741 of the acts of 1951, is hereby amended
3 by striking out the second sentence and inserting in place thereof
4 the following sentence: — For purposes of this section, an insti-
5 tution shall include any sanitorium or wayfarers lodge, any
6 boarding home for convalescent or aged persons, for the opera-
7 tion of which a license is required by law; any facility conducted
8 by an agency incorporated under chapter one hundred and eighty
9 or any special act as a charitable corporation; and any facility
10 operated by municipal, county, state and federal governments;
11 and the term “reside” shall mean “to occupy an established
12 place of abode.”
