By Mr. Keating, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1299) of Fred Trusten and William R. Keating for legislation to place certain correctional employees in Group 4 of the contributory retirement system. Public Service.

**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

AN ACT PLACING CERTAIN CORRECTIONAL EMPLOYEES IN GROUP 4 OF THE CONTRIBUTION RETIREMENT SYSTEM.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Paragraph (g) of subdivision 2 of Section 3 of Chapter 32 of  
2 the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out the following  
3 definition and inserting in its place the following: —  
4 Group 4. - Division of Law Enforcement; Office of the  
5 Secretary of the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs;  
6 officials and employees of the Registry of Motor Vehicles  
7 appointed by the Registrar under Section 29 of Chapter 90;  
8 Capitol Police; members of the State Police Detectives appointed  
9 under Section 6 of Chapter 22, serving in any division of the  
10 Department of Public Safety; members of the police force of the  
11 Metropolitan District Commission; employees of the Massachu-  
12 setts Port Authority at the General Edward International Airport,  
13 comprising permanent crash crewmen, fire control men, assistant  
14 fire control men; members of police and fire departments not  
15 classified in Group 1; any police officer of the Massachusetts Bay  
16 Transportation Authority; employees whose regular compensa-  
17 tion is paid by the United States from funds allocated to the  
18 Massachusetts National Guard and who are regularly and  
19 permanently employed under the control of the military  
20 department of the Commonwealth and whose duties in such  
21 employment require substantially all normal working hours and

22 whose continued employment is based upon federal recognition  
23 in the Massachusetts National Guard; employees of a municipal  
24 gas or electric generating or distribution plant who are employed  
25 as linemen, electric switchboard operators, electric maintenance  
26 men, steam engineers, boiler operators, firemen, oilers,  
27 mechanical maintenance men, and supervisors of said employees;  
28 employees of the Department of Correction who are employed  
29 at any correctional institution or prison camp under the control  
30 of said department and who hold the position of correction officer,  
31 female correction officer, industrial instructor, recreation officer,  
32 assistant industrial shop manager, industrial shop manager,  
33 assistant to the supervisor of industries, supervisor of industries,  
34 senior correction officer, senior female correction officer, prison  
35 camp officer, senior prison camp officer, supervising prison camp  
36 officer, assistant deputy superintendent of supervising  
37 identification agent, correctional counselor I, II, III, employment  
38 service coordinator, supervisor of education, assistant supervisor  
39 of education, principal of institutional school, head teacher of  
40 institutional school, institutional school teacher, institutional  
41 shop instructor, work release coordinator, and librarian;  
42 employees who hold the position of state hospital steward in the  
43 Department of Correction; employees of the Department of  
44 Mental Health, assigned to full-time positions in any correction  
45 facility, who hold the position of senior social worker, principal  
46 clinical social worker, staff clinical social worker, clinical social  
47 work supervisor and rehabilitation counseling; the sheriff, master,  
48 deputy master, assistant deputy master and correction officers of  
49 county correctional facilities; the chief fire warden and district  
50 wardens in the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs.
