HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, May 29, 1911.

The committee on Metropolitan Affairs, to whom were referred the petition (with accompanying bill, House, No. 149) of Charles R. Batt and others for legislation to provide for the removal of the structures used for subway entrances and exits in Scollay square and Court street in the city of Boston and the substitution of more suitable entrances and exits; the petition (with accompanying resolve, House, No. 1110) of Charles A. Dean for legislation to provide for enlarging the Park street subway station in the city of Boston; and so much of the petition (with accompanying bills, House, Nos. 1384, 1385 and 1386) of Charles A. Ufford for legislation to provide for improving passenger and freight transportation in the cities of Boston and Quincy and the towns of Milton and Hyde Park and for the relocation of the station of the Old Colony Railroad Company at Mattapan in the city of Boston, as relates to extending and improving transportation facilities in the city of Boston, report the accompanying resolve.

RESOLVE

To provide for an Investigation as to Certain Improvements of the Subway and Transportation System in the City of Boston.

1 *Resolved*, That the board of railroad commissioners and
2 the Boston transit commission, sitting jointly, be in-
3 structed to investigate the matters contained in the fol-
4 lowing bills and resolve now pending, namely, — house
5 bill, number one hundred and forty-nine, house bill, num-
6 ber thirteen hundred and eighty-four, house bill, number
7 thirteen hundred and eighty-five, and resolve, house, num-
8 ber eleven hundred and ten. The said joint board shall
9 investigate and determine whether it is for the public
10 interest, and expedient, to enact any or all of the legisla-
11 tion prayed for in the petitions accompanying the said
12 bills and resolve; and if the board recommends any legis-
13 lation it shall submit the draft of an act or acts embody-
14 ing the same. The said joint board shall report to the
15 next general court on or before the second Saturday in
16 January, and may expend for the purposes of this resolve
17 such sums of money, to be paid out of the treasury of the
18 commonwealth, as may be necessary, and as shall be ap-
19 proved by the governor and council.
