RESOLVE PROVIDING FOR AN INVESTIGATION AND STUDY BY A SPECIAL COMMISSION RELATIVE TO THE LAWS GOVERNING THE USE OF LIGHTS ON MOTOR VEHICLES WHETHER STATIONARY OR IN MOTION WITH A VIEW OF ESTABLISHING UNIFORM RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE SAME.

1 *Resolved*, That the special commission to consist of two  
2 members of the senate, three members of the house of repre-  
3 sentatives, the commissioner of public safety or his designee,  
4 the registrar of motor vehicles or his designee, and two persons  
5 to be appointed by the governor, is hereby established for the  
6 purpose of making an investigation and study relative to the  
7 laws governing the use of lights on motor vehicles whether  
8 stationary or in motion with a view of establishing uniform  
9 rules and regulations governing the same. Said commission  
10 shall, in the course of its investigation and study, examine  
11 section seven of chapter ninety of the General Laws and  
12 sections fifteen and seventeen of chapter eighty-five of the  
13 General Laws and any other provisions of law related thereto.
